

Did you see us in the Santa Parade? We had signs advertising the church and our Christmas services. We used part of our outreach budget this year to send Easter and Christmas postcards to our neighbors inviting them to attend our services. We are trying to be more visible to the greater community.

This year, Barbara McGovern sent 270 boxes of donated items to underserved schools in West Virginia. She has been performing this act of loving kindness for 13 years and deserves to be recognized. Thank you, Barbara, for being an inspiration!

Your Missions Board

The Diaconate is undertaking a "Who is My Neighbor" project, based on workshops at last spring's and this fall's UCC Super Saturday. The idea is to learn more about ourselves, the people with whom we engage, and those we'd like to engage. This process of information gathering should help us determine TCC's true mission. Members of the Diaconate will be meeting with TCC boards, committees and other groups, such as the choirs and Bible Study group, to ask three questions:

Stewardship Brunch Recipes Here are some of the recipes from the brunch held

November 3rd. Lots of delicious-ness!

Manteiga's Strata

Ingredients:

10 slices bread (any kind), buttered and cubed

³/₄ lb cheddar, shredded

3/4 lb mozzarella, shredded

1 lb sausage

8 eggs

3 ½ Cup milk

1/4 teaspoon Paprika

½ teaspoon Curry

1 teaspoon Dry Mustard

½ teaspoon Salt

1/8 teaspoon Cayenne Pepper

In a 9 x 13 inch casserole dish, layer ½ bread, ½ cheese, sausage, remaining bread, remaining cheese

Whisk eggs, milk, spices together, and pour over egg and cheese mixture.

Refrigerate overnight

Bake in morning at 325 F for 1 hour.

Note – you can substitute anything you want for the sausage – sometimes I use ham, or broccoli, peppers and onions, or a combination.

Easy Toast Casserole French (Lorene Beach)

Ingredients:

1 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup butter

1 (8 ounce) loaf crusty French bread, cut into bit-sized pieces, or as needed

2 cups milk

6 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 pinch ground cinnamon, or to taste

1 tablespoon brown sugar, or as needed

Directions:

1 Grease a 9x12-inch baking dish.

2 Stir I cup brown sugar and butter together in a saucepan over medium-low heat until butter melts and sugar dissolves into butter, 2 to 4 minutes. Pour into prepared baking dish and spread a 1 1/2 to 2-inch layer of bread pieces over the top.

3 Beat milk, eggs, and vanilla extract together in a bowl; pour milk mixture over bread into the baking dish and

move bread as necessary to ensure all bread is absorbing liquid. Sprinkle cinnamon over the top. Cover the dish with plastic wrap and refrigerate, 8 hours to overnight. 4 Preheat oven to 450 degrees F (230 degrees C). Remove and discard plastic wrap from baking dish and sprinkle remaining brown sugar over the top of the bread mixture. 5 Bake in the preheated oven until browned and bubbling, about 30 minutes.

Notes:

I used cinnamon swirl bread, 1 loaf, cut into bite sized pieces.

I mixed the cinnamon and brown sugar in with the egg mixture. (this was by mistake, but I'd probably do it again.) I used about 1 T cinnamon because I love cinnamon.

Then, before I cooked it the next morning I sprinkled with cinnamon and brown sugar.

HAZEL'S STRATA

12 slices white bread cut into 12 inch squares

1 lb. ham cubed; and some raw veggie for crunch;

2 C shredded Monterrey Jack Cheese

2 C shredded cheddar cheese

6 eggs; 1/2 cup butter melted; 3 cups milk room temperature

Grease 9 x 13 pan. Layer 1/2 the bread, 1/2 the cheeses; 1/2 the ham; and the veggie into the pan. (I used broccoli

florets.) Repeat layers.

Mix eggs, milk and melted butter in bowl. Pour over layers. Refrigerate over night (or at least 2 hrs.) Bake at 350 deg. for 45-50 minutes. Let sit for 10 minutes.

TIP: Milk s/b at room temp. prior to adding the melted butter so the butter won't harden into droplets or little flakes.

Cinnamon Rolls (from the Betty Crocker Cookbook 1st Edition) (1950)

Soak 2 packages of dry granular yeast in 1/2 cup lukewarm water for 5 minutes without stirring. Stir well before adding.

Mix together 1 ^{1/2} cups lukewarm milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tsp. salt. Add yeast.

Stir in 2 eggs, 1/2 cup soft shortening.

Mix in first with a spoon and then by hand 7 to $7^{1/2}$ cups

of sifted flour. Add flour in 2 additions, using the amount necessary to make it easy to handle. Once it is mixed, turn it out onto a lightly floured board to knead. Fold dough over toward you, then press down away from you with the heel of your hand. Turn a quarter turn, and repeat until it's smooth, elastic, and doesn't stick to the board. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to bring the greased side up.

Recipes continued...

Cover with a damp cloth and let rise in a warm, draft free spot (80 to 85 degrees) until it is double—1 1/2 to 2 hours. To check if it is doubled, press two fingers into the dough. It will leave indentations when doubled. Punch the dough down in the center, fold the edges into the center and turn completely over in the bowl. Let rise again until almost double in bulk (30 to 45 minutes). After the second rising, roll the dough into an oblong 9 x 18". Spread with 2 tbsp. softened butter and sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar and 2 tsp. cinnamon. Roll up tightly, beginning at the wide side. Seal well by pinching the edges of the roll together. Cut roll into 1" slices. Place a little apart on a greased 13 x 9" pan or in muffin cups.

Cover and let rise until double in bulk (35 to 40 minutes). Bake until golden brown and completely baked through.

TEMPERATURE: 375 degrees (quick mod. oven)

TIME: 25 to 30 minutes
