Dear Church,

After moving into our new home last Spring, we turned to landscaping chores. We had quite a bit of the landscaping completed during the fall, but winter set in before we could get the grass seed down. The one thing that became evident as time went on was that controlling the water from the rain and melting snow was going to be an issue. As we graded the lot before the ground froze, it wasn't always possible to see the very slight gradations that are now clearly visible because we have little lakes, ponds and streams forming all over the property. In an effort to control the water before the seed goes down this spring, we'll have to dig some trenches and redesign some of the gardens. I'm learning that the more I try to control, the more I realize I can't control. And that has been the story of our lives these past few years too, hasn't it? We have lost control over our lives and had to pivot on a dime here, there and everywhere in order to stay safe and keep others safe. What we learned during this time was that we really don't have control, as much as we'd like to believe. What I'm finding because of our drainage issues is that I've been forced to explore new ways to cope. And so I've learned about rain gardens and other interesting ideas to divert the water. I'd have never considered those exciting new concepts without being forced to pivot. And as a church who's been forced to pivot quite a bit lately, we've learned we can do online worship and that we are reaching people we couldn't reach with only inperson worship. It causes me to wonder what else we've learned or can still discover, especially during our Lenten journey, that will bring us into a new place that meets our needs and supports the needs of our neighbors. I'm hoping you will be a part of that discovery. That you'll share your ideas with our leaders and offer your time and talent to make them become a reality. The sky's the limit, but the question is, "what will we do with this unique opportunity?" May God guide us as we discover new opportunities of being in ministry together.

Annual Meeting Wrap-Up

Trinitarian's Annual Meeting was held on Sunday, January 30th. Originally planned as a hybrid Zoom and in-person meeting, we pivoted to all-Zoom when a blizzard was forecast for the day before. Twenty-eight people participated in our important annual business meeting.

The first order of business was to thank Sarah Dunlap, who resigned as moderator, and to note that a "thank you" book is available in the Narthex so the congregation can write notes to Sarah for all her years of service to the church. Next up was thanking Doug Beach, who has resigned as sexton.

Pastor Debra next spoke about the vision of the church and our future together..

The Trustees were asked about the boiler and possibly adding handicap access to the Narthex. There are no plans at present to change anything in regard to these two issues. Bill Pickles did note that we have negotiated a contract with Dish Network for another cell tower, and that we are in negotiations to lease space to a pre-school.

Betsy Manteiga of the Stewardship Committee noted that pledging was up for the year, which is very positive for the church.

Treasurer George Carifio noted the church is in good financial shape. Investments are growing and liabilities are low, and we broke even for 2021.

There was discussion during the budget review about our desire to begin recording the live service to later upload to YouTube, rather than having a separate recorded service.

The leadership slate was discussed and approved, with David Deems being confirmed as Moderator, and Mark Reid and Glen Ayer as co-chairs of the Diaconate. There are openings on most committees and you are encouraged to reach out to the chairs if you are interested in serving.
